



Community Safety Fund – Round 9

Application Guidance

August 2026

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1. Introduction

The Humberside Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) is the voice of the public in East Yorkshire and Northern Lincolnshire, elected to work on your behalf and hold the police to account. In addition to commissioning the police service for the area, the PCC commissions a range of other services to help cut crime, improve community safety and provide support for victims of crime.

The PCC's Community Safety Fund offers grants towards the costs of community safety and crime reduction projects across the Humber area (East Riding of Yorkshire, Hull, North East Lincolnshire and North Lincolnshire). It is designed to support community organisations to kick-start local projects that will cut crime and antisocial behaviour and improve feelings of safety.

The Community Safety Fund forms part of the PCC's Delivery Fund, which was created following a commitment in the Police and Crime Plan 2021-2025. Further funding through the CSF is now being made available to support the delivery of the Police and Crime Plan (2024-29) between 2025/26 and 2028/29. This document provides guidance for **Round 9** of the Community Safety Fund. Please note that **some of the eligibility criteria has changed substantially since previous rounds** and some activities may no longer be eligible for funding support. There are also some additional requirements around **seeking quotations** and changes to **match funding** levels if you have accessed the scheme previously.

2. Available funding and timescales

The PCC's Community Safety Fund can provide funding of between £500 and £35,000 to projects that meet the scheme criteria. It is split into two categories: the criteria is the same, but larger projects are required to provide more information.

Category	Minimum grant	Maximum grant	Maximum project size
Small grants	£500	£5,000	£25,000
Medium grants	£5,001	£35,000	£175,000

A maximum project size (including funding from other sources) is in place to ensure projects are focused and the impact derived from the PCC's investment can be clearly understood.

Grant funding will be paid in arrears – payment in advance can be agreed in exceptional circumstances where cashflow may be an issue for the applicant.

Exceptional cases

In exceptional cases the PCC may be able to provide funding greater than £35,000 to strategically important projects that will have a substantial impact on communities. Please contact us by email if you wish to propose such a project.

Round 9 Project Timescales

Round 9 projects **should not commence delivery any earlier than 01 January 2027**. Please ensure that this is factored into your delivery timescales, financial profile and when seeking quotes for the work.

You will receive **notification of the application outcome in late November** and those projects that have been successful will receive a Grant Agreement in December to enable a **project start from January 2027 onwards**.

3.Scope: what can the PCC's Community Safety Fund support?

The PCC's Community Safety Fund exists to support projects that will contribute to reducing crime/antisocial behaviour and/or improving community safety, supporting the delivery of the Police and Crime Plan.

The Police and Crime Plan

The Police and Crime Plan sets the strategic police and crime objectives for the area. The current plan (2024-2029) has three aims:

1. Engaged, Resilient and Inclusive Communities
2. Safer Communities
3. Effective Organisations

We are particularly keen to support projects which can demonstrate a contribution to delivering multiple objectives of the Police and Crime Plan. You will be asked about how your project contributes to the outcomes and objectives of the Police and Crime Plan as part of the Application process.

The Fund operates on a competitive basis, with projects that deliver the greatest impact and the best value for money given priority.

The Fund will also seek to invest in a portfolio of projects across the Humber area and the Fund's scope.

4. Eligibility criteria

In order to be awarded funding, projects and the organisations proposing them must meet the Fund's eligibility criteria. Applications that do not meet the eligibility criteria will be rejected.

Please read the criteria carefully before applying and contact us if you are unsure whether your project would be eligible.

Purpose of the project

Round 9 of the Community Safety Fund can provide funding to support projects which involve **the purchase of and / or installation of equipment and /or assets** which will support the reduction in crime and improvement in community safety.

The following types of projects / activities are likely to be “in scope” for this round of the Fund:

- Purchase of equipment / assets which facilitate activities that will:
 - divert people from crime or antisocial behaviour taking place in the local area
 - support people who may be particularly at risk of becoming victims of crime, or have previously been victims of crime
- Measures / minor capital work to improve the security of community buildings or assets e.g. security measures, fencing, CCTV, alarm systems etc (this should not include improvements that are a key part of ongoing property maintenance)
- Measures to improve the safety of outdoor public spaces e.g. CCTV installation, fencing etc

This Round of the fund is **not designed to fund ongoing revenue-based activities** – it is an enabling fund to support the purchase of equipment / assets which can support such activities and for the provision of enhanced security measures for community buildings, assets and outdoor spaces.

Please refer to the list of ineligible activities before starting your application.

This includes several activities that are project specific which we are not looking to invest in due to the potential to duplicate existing or planned activity by the OPCC.

Organisations Eligible to Apply

The following organisations are eligible to apply for funding from the PCC's Community Safety Fund:

- Non-profit organisations e.g. charities, social enterprises, community groups
- Town and parish councils

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The following organisations will not be eligible to apply directly, but could co-fund projects led by eligible organisations:

- Unitary local authorities (i.e. Hull City Council, East Riding of Yorkshire Council, North Lincolnshire Council and North East Lincolnshire Council)
- Humberside Police, Humberside Fire & Rescue Service and other statutory services
- Other large public sector organisations and government agencies (e.g. NHS organisations)
- For-profit businesses

Whilst recently established organisations can apply to the Fund, we may need to put in place additional safeguards for organisations without a demonstrable track record in order to protect public funds.

Funded organisations must have formal governance documents in place (e.g. a constitution), with a **management team/board of trustees of at least three people who are not related**. The organisation must have a bank account in its own name that requires at least two signatories who are not related.

The Fund cannot support individuals or informal groups of individuals and **cannot pay grants into personal bank accounts**.

The Fund cannot support organisations that are in financial difficulty.

If you are unsure whether your organisation is eligible to apply, please contact us for advice before starting your application.

Funding

The amount of funding requested and the overall project size must be in accordance with the table on Page 4.

Projects should generally have a “match funding” contribution equivalent to **at least 10%** of the value of the project as a **direct financial contribution** to the project’s costs. In-kind contributions can only be considered as part of this round if they involve staff/volunteer time working on the installation of the specific measures. Project management costs are not eligible as in-kind match funding.

If your organisation has accessed the Community Safety Fund in previous rounds, you will be required to provide a greater match funding contribution to the overall project costs. This is on a sliding scale as follows:

- **New to the fund** – minimum match funding contribution of **at least 10%** of the total project cost
- Had **one grant previously through CSF** – minimum match funding contribution of **at least 30%** of the total project cost
- Had **more than one grant previously through CSF** – minimum match funding contribution of **at least 50%** of the total project cost

For projects submitted by town and parish councils, a financial contribution is **mandatory**.

Applicants are required to provide a breakdown of the grant and match funding, as well as details of the project costs.

Value for Money

Applicants **must seek a minimum of three quotes for purchases over £5,000**.

For purchases of **£1,000 and over, a minimum of two quotes is required** to ensure best value. Details of quotes should be included within the project application form and copies provided upon request.

Applicants should select their preferred supplier but the CSF would only be able to **contribute towards the value of the lowest price quote** unless applicants can provide evidence of a quality assessment having been included as part of the procurement exercise.

In exceptional circumstances, we could consider contributing towards a higher quote such as when availability issues would impact on draw down of match funding or when there are wider savings from using an existing supplier (not just that the applicant has an existing relationship with a particular supplier). If this applies, this should be highlighted in your application.

Ineligible Projects and Expenditure

The following types of project and expenditure are not eligible for support:

- General appeals and sponsorships (we need to see a clearly defined project)
- Projects expected to take more than 12 months to complete
- Projects taking place outside the Humber area
- Academic research and educational bursaries
- Projects that only benefit one individual or family
- Projects that are the continuation of a core service or organisation
- Projects of a political or religious nature (except multi-faith projects)
- Multiple applications which falsely split activities in order to get around the maximum funding levels
- Projects that are already fully funded by other means
- Projects that have already started or been completed
- Projects with a funding gap remaining after this grant
- Rent/hire of the organisation's own facilities or equipment (unless reasonable costs are included as in-kind match funding)
- Projects that unnecessarily duplicate activity already funded by the PCC, local authorities or other funders

- Projects seeking to establish grant/loan funds for onward distribution
- Interest payments or repayment of existing debts
- Commercial ventures
- Works to buildings and premises owned by large public sector organisations, individuals or for-profit organisations
- Works to buildings / assets which are cosmetic or part of general maintenance responsibilities
- Replacement windows and doors and Physical Access Control (PAC) systems
- Projects seeking to exclude or negatively affect a group of people because of their age, gender, sexual orientation, ethnicity or religion
- Activities which are part of a statutory requirement
- Speed Indicator Devices or AutoSpeedWatch Cameras (SIDs applications should be directed to the Road Safety Measures Grant Scheme)
- Installation of speed bumps and speed limit signage on internal sites
- Projects that work within schools due to the potential to duplicate existing and planned activity by the OPCC
- Projects that provide 'target hardening packs' to individual households – due to the potential to duplicate a separate activity commissioned by the OPCC
- Production of video content and campaigns and other information or training resources (given the potential to duplicate existing and planned activity)
- Food banks
- Park equipment and Outdoor Gym Equipment
- Activities intended to influence Parliament, government or political parties; attempting to influence the awarding or renewal of contracts and grants; or attempting to influence legislative or regulatory action

Sustainability

Details of how the purchased assets / equipment will be sustained beyond the grant investment including how any ongoing running costs will be funded should be included within the application form.

Permissions

For any capital works or installation of equipment (for example fencing or CCTV), the applicants must ensure that the necessary permissions are sought and in place from the landlord of the premises / landowners of the premises / land upon which this is to be installed. The necessary planning permissions must also be in place or due to be in place prior to the project start date.

For properties that are leased from another organisations, please provide further details in the relevant section of the application form.

The necessary permissions shall be sought in advance of the works commencing and must not impact on the deliverability of the project. Evidence of this shall be provided to the OPCC upon request.

Security Measures

For projects that include the installation of security measures such as CCTV and fencing, it is recommended that you seek professional advice regarding the placement and specification of your proposed security solutions, especially for those projects that are over £10,000 in value.

As part of the appraisal of your project, we may arrange a visit from a Designing out Crime Officer to review your proposal.

We recommend that for CCTV projects where the cameras are accessible that you include anti-vandal measures to ensure the long-term sustainability of the investment in cameras.

You can access further guidance through Secured by Design (SBD), the official police security initiative that works to improve the security of buildings and their immediate surroundings to provide safe places to live, work, shop and visit.

SBD operates an accreditation scheme on behalf of the UK Police Service for products or services that have met recognised security standards. These products or services – which must be capable of deterring or preventing crime - are known as being of a 'Police Preferred Specification'. SBD is the only way for companies to obtain police recognition for security-related products in the UK.

As a condition of the grant, the operators of any CCTV system must comply with the provisions of the Data Protection Act 2018 (DPA), the Protection of Freedoms Act 2012 (PoFA) and follow the guidance in the current edition of the Surveillance Camera Code of Practice issued pursuant to the PoFA. The grant recipient is expected to maintain a suitable policy and monitor and record compliance with it. Evidence must be provided to the HOPCC upon request.

All CCTV operators recording for crime prevention purposes now need to register with the Information Commissioners Office (ICO) and pay a data protection fee, unless you are exempt. Further details are available at: [Data protection and your business: Using CCTV - GOV.UK](#)

Community Payback

Community Payback is where offenders work on projects to pay back the community for their crimes, for example by:

- removing graffiti
- clearing wasteland

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- improving and decorating a public place or building, like a community centre
- repainting communal areas
- making pathways accessible
- clearing alleys
- doing grounds maintenance and gardening
- planting trees
- picking litter

The work must:

- benefit the local community
- not take paid work away from others
- not make a profit for anyone

Use of Artificial Intelligence

You can use AI tools to help you to write your application. We will not reject an application just because AI was used.

AI tools can provide a useful starting point and can be used to improve the efficiency of your application writing process. They can, however, introduce an increased risk of inaccuracies, misleading statements and produce generic content.

We recommend that you use AI with caution and ensure you check its accuracy. You will be required to indicate in your application if you have used AI and to confirm that the content created has been checked for accuracy.

Please also be mindful of the impact of the use of AI on privacy and data protection. AI tools may store the data you input and as a result could compromise confidentiality. If you input your organisation's data into AI tools, ensure that you do so in compliance with relevant legislation. Where personal information is used, please refer to the Information Commissioner's Office for guidance on AI and data protection.

5. Grant conditions

To accept an offer of a grant, you will need to agree to our grant conditions. These include:

- Following the publicity guidance provided by the OPCC
- Having appropriate insurance cover in place for the project (e.g. public liability cover)
- For projects working with children or vulnerable people, a safeguarding policy must be in place
- Providing monitoring/progress information to the OPCC
- Claiming and using the grant funds for their proposed purpose within a specific timeframe, and returning any unspent funds to the OPCC

Full details will be provided if you are offered a grant. Also see **Section 7** for further details on what to expect if your application is successful.

6. How to apply

Applications to the PCC's Community Safety Fund can be made via our online grants portal (<https://smallgrants.humberside-pcc.gov.uk>), which will also be used to manage successful grants. To start an application, please follow the prompts to register for a free user account from the homepage.

Please note that we are unable to consider applications submitted by other means. If you are unable to use the portal please contact us for assistance.

Please do not send any information in addition to your application (e.g. images, videos, brochures, reports) as we are unable to consider these. The online application form is designed to capture all of the information required for us to consider your project.

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Please note that the Application Form has been updated substantially since previous rounds. If you have drafted an application previously, this should still be accessible on the online portal but information will need to be transferred to the new, updated Application Form which is being used for the current round.

As outlined earlier in this guidance, **the eligibility criteria for Round 9 and requirements have changed since previous rounds** and some activities may no longer be eligible for funding support so resubmission would not be appropriate.

Application deadlines

The Fund is allocated through bidding rounds. The deadline for applications to Round 9 is **07 October 2026 at 12:00 noon**.

Please allow sufficient time to complete and submit your application. Please do not leave your application to the last minute as we cannot guarantee support will be available on the application deadline day should issues arise.

Any future rounds will be subject to there being available funds left in the pot. The application process is highly competitive and we will not be able to fund all bids submitted.

Due to the high levels of applications anticipated, we will be unable to provide detailed feedback on applications but you will be **notified of the outcome in late November**.

Projects should commence **no earlier than 01 January 2027** and must be **no longer than a year in duration**.

7. What happens if my application is successful?

You will receive notification from the Funding Team regarding the outcome of the assessment panel.

Please note all correspondence and communications relating to projects will be sent from PCCFunding@humberside.police.uk.

Upon accepting the Grant offer awarded to the organisation the Funding Team will ask for the following details/ documents to draft the project Grant Agreement (depending on the type of project):

- Child/ Adult Safeguarding Policy
- Contact details of the Designated Safeguard Lead
- Evidence of quotes
- Confirmation that required permissions are in place i.e. premises / site owners, planning permission etc.

The lead contact will then be sent a Grant Agreement which outlines the terms and conditions of the grant which you will be required to sign electronically using AdobeSign.

Once signed you can commence the project and, once complete, you can claim the grant in line with the agreed costs outlined in your Grant Agreement.

Payments are made in arrears and based upon actual expenditure incurred (i.e. the funding has been spent and is claimed back, providing evidence that this has been spent).

Every successful project will receive a pre-populated Claim and Monitoring form which is designed to track the progress of the project and capture agreed outcomes and outputs. This where spend on the project is reported against the agreed forecast for the period, as outlined in the Grant Agreement. This is broken down into the agreed grant and match funding.

Grant Claim and Monitoring forms must be accompanied by **evidence of spend which includes invoices, receipts and bank statements**. The Grant Claim and Monitoring Form should also be accompanied by an invoice, addressed to the HOPCC, for the value of the grant claimed.

Incomplete Grant Claim and Monitoring Forms will result in a delayed payment and approval. Any issues with the completion, it is important to contact the Funding Team before the claim deadline on PCCFunding@humberside.police.uk.

Following the approval of your completed Claims and Monitoring form, grant funding will be paid to the grant recipient's Business Bank Account.

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Grant Recipients must notify the team as soon as reasonably practicable if an under spend is forecast, if there are delays to your proposed project or if you are no longer able to proceed.

Round 9 is designed for projects that will be completed by the end of March 2027 so all claims for funding should be submitted in line with the following deadline:

- Q4 2026/27 – 16 April 2027

The Figure 1 below summarises the process right through from application to payment of grant:
